Collect

Readings Revelation 7.9-17

After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, 'Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!' And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshipped God, singing, 'Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and might be to our God for ever and ever! Amen.' For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.'

Gospel Matthew 5:1-12

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying: 'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 'Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. 'Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. 'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. 'Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy. 'Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. 'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. 'Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 'Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

ALL SAINTS – 25/10/20 – BIBLE SUNDAY Matthew 24.30-35: Signs of Times / Scriptures

There's so much in that reading that we could spend all day grappling with...

... but the Churchwardens have made it clear that what with the annual meeting to follow I should speak briefly or not at all, so I'll skip the tricky bits...

... and just say two things.

The first thing is

• Read the signs of the times "From the fig tree learn its lesson..." ... says Jesus.

So what do you read, when you look at the times we're living through? Bishop Rose has been asking us all two questions:

- What are we noticing?
- What are we learning?

All Saints Church building hasn't been able to open, even since lockdown was lifted. What does that say? What does it mean?

I'm an engineer by training, but I'm not asking engineers' questions, here. What does it mean for Maidstone, that that building is closed? What does it mean for your congregations.

When something that's been there for ever and looks as if it's going to be there forever suddenly isn't there for us to worship in. What does it mean?

It means you've had no choice but to worship together as a parish. What does that mean?

It means there are immense challenges facing your new Vicar – whoever she is... (or he is...) Challenges far too great for one person to tackle alone, or a small group of people to tackle alone

It means you can't take for granted that things will go on the way they have been. None of us can. The pandemic has done for the Church what it's done for retail. A whole load of things that were happening very slowly have suddenly happened quickly.

Including the ability to change very quickly.

Imagine if 'the diocese' had issued an edict telling churches (and the cathedral) to get their worship online in to weeks flat... The emails, the phone calls, the thousand reasons why it was impossible. But it happened.

In lots of places it happened.

• Read the signs of the times "From the fig tree learn its lesson..."

Second thing

• Read the scriptures.

"Heaven and earth will pass away...

... says Jesus.

...but my words will not pass away.

We live in an age where truth is in short supply. In my adult lifetime I'd gradually got used to more and more political spin. Now that's giving way in lots of places to outright lying.

It used to be fashionable – among the so-called liberal elite – to question whether there really is such a thing as truth. Now those very people are appalled to see our leaders sit so lightly to the facts.

And then a pandemic comes along. And no-one's immune. And hard science can't be spun away, or lied away.

"What is truth?"

Asked Pontius Pilate. The cynical leader. Idly. As if it didn't really matter.

And the irony was that Truth was standing there in front of him. But we know Jesus said

"I am the Truth"

We know Jesus said

"The truth will set them free"

At least, I hope we know it. It's not spin or lies that set us free, it's truth. If we do know it, it's because we read it, or heard it, from the Bible.

- Read the scriptures.
- Read the signs of the times

At times like these. Times of turmoil. Times of change. Go back to what historians call the source documents. Wrestle – as we haven't had time to this morning – with the tricky bits.

'Dwell in the Word' – as some of you – and loads us in the diocese from the Bishop downwards are learning to do. And finding that the word speaks direct to our lives.

Read, mark learn and inwardly digest. Because at times like these it turns out that a lot of the things we thought would be there for ever are transitory after all.
