Reading Acts 4 32-35

Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any

possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need.

Gospel John 20.19-end

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me. so I send vou.' When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them: if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.' But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So, the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.' A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put vour finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.' Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.' Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Easter Sunday 2021

The long day stretched into night and time crept onward towards the new day. With the first gold of dawn came a resurrection, a new hope that grew with the rising sun and went out to a waiting world.

The American preacher, Frederick Beuchner, reflects on how differently the gospels portray Christmas and Easter. Unlike the birth narratives that are accompanied by choirs of angels and bright starlit heavens, Easter dawns gradually and quietly, and almost with a whisper.

When Mary Magdalene arrived at the tomb in John's account, she thought at first that it must be the gardener standing there in the shadows, and when she saw who it really was and tried to embrace him, he told her not to. In Mark's account, today's gospel, Easter is greeted by the women with fear rather than glory.

The way the gospel writers tell it Jesus came back from death not in a blaze of glory, but more like a candle in the dark, flickering first in this place, then in that place, then in no place at all. They are not trying to tell it as convincingly as they can. They are trying to describe it as truthfully as they can.

The truth for me, and I can only speak for me, is that flickering candles in the dark rather than dramatic blazes of glory, is how I so often experience resurrection, and that seems especially poignant at this time as we emerge from the darkness of lockdown, taking faltering steps into this new reality, hesitant and uncertain but still believing that with the first gold of dawn a resurrection comes, a new hope growing with the rising sun.

Although we may not fully understand what resurrection means; although it may be just a flickering flame in the darkness, if we have listened closely to the story we should hold fast to what we do know, and to what the disciples were told, that Jesus goes before us into Galilee, in other words Jesus stands with us and beside us wherever we are, inviting us to walk with him in the way of the cross which is none other than the way of unconditional love and unrestricted grace.

As one writer puts it, the resurrection is simply God's unwillingness to take no for an answer. God raised Jesus, not as an invitation to come to heaven when we die, some kind of insurance policy, but as a declaration that he himself has now established permanent residence here on earth.

Jesus stands beside us strengthening us in this life. He is the promise of a love that will not let us go; he is the promise of a love that will accompany us in our times of doubt and fear; he is the promise of a God who will prompt us to do new things, to take risks, to continue the adventure of our lives in hope, whatever challenges and obstacles we may face along the way.

So in the heartache that still affects so many people in the wake of this pandemic; in the desperate plight of those refugees fleeing the poverty and terror of Syria and other war torn countries; in the everyday experiences of those living with the reality of mental illness, addiction or abuse and in so many other places of darkness and despair, the flickering flame of resurrection demands that we continue to believe in a God who is not some remote figure way up in the clouds, but a living presence at work within us and

among us, continuing the work of resurrection, continuing the battle against inhumanity and darkness that shrouds so many in our world. The resurrection is simply God's unwillingness to take no for an answer!

In 1935 as the threat of war began to cast its shadow across Europe, an Easter Orthodox Bishop wrote this prayer. It is a forceful comment on the truth of resurrection and it speaks as powerfully into our context as it did into his

Lord Jesus Christ, the storms of life do not frighten those whose hearts are ablaze with the light of your flame. Outside is the darkness of the whirlwind, the terror and the howling of the storm. But in our souls reign quiet and light. Christ is here and the heart sings. Alleluia

We pray Lord for broken communities across the world, ravaged by war, poverty and hunger; we ask your forgiveness for our own apathy, and our temptation to wash our hands of involvement in the plight of others

May you continue to walk with us and set our hearts on fire with your love

Risen Lord, as we continue to remember those who are struggling with their physical or mental health, surround them, their families and friends, and all those who care for them, with your presence and peace

May you continue to walk with us and set our hearts on fire with your love

Jesus Christ, you meet us; your hands still wounded but your breath warm and your conversation engaging. Death has not changed your accent or diminished your love. As we gather for prayer in this Easter season, cheer us by your gospel and make our worship your Emmaus road. **Amen**
