After his return from the defeat of Chedorlaomer and the kings who were with him, the king of Sodom went out to meet him at the Valley of Shaveh (that is, the King's Valley). 'Come and follow me'

12 years ago, Liz and I were invited to join a group of our newly ordained priests on a pilgrimage to Jordan. On the first day our guide took us to a place called Gadara which overlooked the Sea of Galilee. As we gazed out at this stretch of water which we had read about so many times I looked across at our new priests. They were silent, their eyes focussed on the place where so much of Jesus' ministry had taken place. It was an extraordinary moment as all of us, in our imaginations, were taken back to the scene described for us in today's gospel reading from Mark where Simon and Andrew heard the call of Jesus for the first time, 'come and follow me.'

That call has echoed through the ages drawing countless folk to the one who proclaimed 'good news to the poor, release for the captives, recovery of sight to the blind and freedom for the oppressed.' I think especially, in the week of Joe Biden's inauguration, of Martin Luther-King whose birthday was celebrated on Monday. He heard the call of Jesus and was inspired to dare to dream of a better world with justice a reality for all God's children.

In this time of pandemic with 'good news' in such short supply perhaps that call echoes even more loudly, imploring us not to lose hope but to persevere in faith; supporting family, friends and neighbours who might be struggling; praying for our exhausted hospital and care workers who are under so much strain; and taking a few moments each day for ourselves to consciously place ourselves into the arms of God that we may be strengthened and refreshed by God's grace and love.

John Coates

John was born on Saturday the 13th May 1933 and died on Monday the 28th December 2020

A Eulogy delivered at John's funeral by his daughter Jeanette and brother Malcolm

John's funeral was held at Vinters Park Crematorium Maidstone at 3.30pm on Tuesday the 12th January 2021.

John was born 13 May 1933, the second child of Violet Burns and Leonard Coates. The family lived at 231 Tonbridge Road, close to their grandparents and John spent a lot of time with them. At the age of 5 he started school at Westborough and Sunday school at St. Andrews Church. He remembered the day when war was declared, the sirens sounded and he and his brother Brian went to the bottom or their garden and hid by the artichokes! At the age of 7 he joined Brian in St. Andrews Choir and during the following years, became server and assistant cub master. At the age of 14 he was confirmed by the Bishop of Dover at All Saints Church.

John passed the '11 plus' exam and attended Maidstone Boys Technical High School (now Oakwood Park Grammar School). He left school at 15 and spent the next 2 years as a horticultural student learning all about fruit growing at East Malling Research. He then attended Kent Farm College for one year until he was called up for National Service. After basic training at Wilmslow, he then went to RAF Henlow for ceremonial training so he could take part in the funeral parade of King George VI.

Afterwards he was sent to train as an aerodrome fireman at Sutton-on-Hull, and was then posted to RAF Hawkinge where he had further training. He then became an Instructor to WRAF cadets and was made Corporal. It was here in 1953 that he met Mavis Armstrong, and they married in November 1954.

At the end of his RAF service, John joined the Silver City Air Company at Lydd Airfield in the same capacity as the RAF. In 1958, Mavis gave birth to Jeanette. Having been made redundant in 1960, John joined Wakefield Corn, Coal and Seed Merchants as Depot Manager back in Maidstone. There he attended various training courses run by the National Coal Board and was awarded Diplomas. In 1979 he was invited to join The Livery Company of Woodmongers and Coal Sellers and in 1982 became a Freeman of the City of London.

In 1984 the principal of Wakefields retired and sold the company to Charringtons, and John was promoted to the Company Manager. In 1989 the coal business was in decline and John found himself redundant once more. Fortunately John was able to find work as a driver for M&D, driving the new Park and Ride buses. He passed the necessary examinations and was awarded the Safe Driving Diploma at the end of his career.

John has remained a church chorister for over 70 years, singing in various cathedrals and churches, the longest being All Saints in Maidstone. In 1999 he was approached by Archbishop Carey to thank him for his mission at All Saints.

In 1983 and 1985, Jeanette gave birth to two lovely granddaughters, Rebecca and Nicola, and John became very close to them during their early years.

In 2007, John was devastated when he lost his dear wife after 53 years of marriage. During this time John was very thankful for the love and support Jen, Rebecca and Nicola gave him. In 2011 John became a great-grandfather to Jonathan, in 2014 to Emilia and Jesse in 2016. Towards the end of 2014 John's dementia worsened and he was forced to leave his home and move to a Care Home in Queens Avenue, Maidstone where he received the care he needed. John's brother Brian and sisters Anne and Margaret were all born within a few years of one another. They grew up and played together and John was the ring- leader who led them into mischief and sometimes trouble. The girls were usually blamed but John often got away with it by telling mother that he would buy her a bath chair in her old age! Sister Anne remembers him sitting in her doll's pram and the bottom falling through!

He had a sense of fun and enthusiastically joined in our family cricket matches. On one April Fool's day he got my father, who was a football referee, out of bed early with a hoax phone call that someone from the local Referee's Association wanted to speak to him. I don't think my father was well pleased!

John didn't like to hang about and punctuality was important to him. If he was taking you out and he was ready and you weren't, he would usually say, 'Come on, let's be having you!' He was hard - working, loving towards his family and loyal to his employers, and those choirmasters he sang under. He will be very much missed by his daughter Jen and granddaughters Rebecca and Nicola. I too shall miss him, especially as a fellow chorister.

May he rest in peace.
